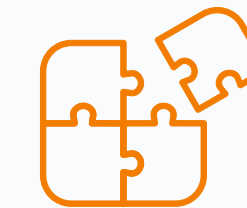

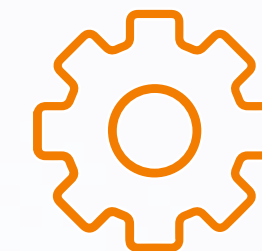

2.1. Areas of expertise

At CODESPA we specialize in three large areas.



Business & Technical Training Programs for Micro-entrepreneurs

We provide skills training for employment and entrepreneurship in vulnerable communities. Our technical and business training is tailored to the needs of the local market, enhancing confidence and leadership abilities while promoting long-term economic growth in the area.



Financial Services for those seeking entrepreneurial opportunities.

We address financial exclusion through education and the design of adapted products. We offer comprehensive financial education and develop inclusive financial products. We strengthen microfinance institutions, create savings and credit groups, and facilitate access to credit for microentrepreneurs and vulnerable communities.



Rural Market Development

We build partnerships with local actors and private companies to develop rural markets, empowering microenterprises and social enterprises. We facilitate entrepreneurship and dignified employment by organizing production, aiding in product commercialization, and increasing the incomes of vulnerable communities. Additionally, we identify business opportunities and attract low-cost technologies.

3.1. The CODE Method. Our Scalable Poverty Alleviation Framework

The CODE Method is CODESPA's approach to solving poverty. Each of our projects and programs follows this method, successfully applied by our technicians. It is the result of nearly forty years of proven experience.

This method focuses on creating opportunities, encouraging the active participation of our beneficiaries, transferring knowledge, and empowering the vulnerable communities we work with. It consists of four fundamental steps that guide people on their journey from poverty to prosperity.

3.1.1. Step by step The CODE Method



Create community centered strategies

We develop strategies based on specific needs. We listen to the community, respect its culture, and study the local economy to design relevant and viable projects that support people and enable the creation of microbusinesses.



Obtain participation of the most vulnerable

We incorporate the most vulnerable into our projects by providing incentives to alleviate their fears, designing personalized training, and creating a progressive path. We start with the most qualified members of the community and encourage them to involve others.



Deliver knowledge, financial services and market access

We provide training, access to financial services, and market opportunities to help local communities with business management and job searches, promoting economic growth and inclusion. We also establish alliances to further strengthen these communities..



Empower locals and exit

We train individuals to sustain the growth of their businesses or employment in the long term. We implement exit strategies to promote the independence and self-sufficiency of communities.

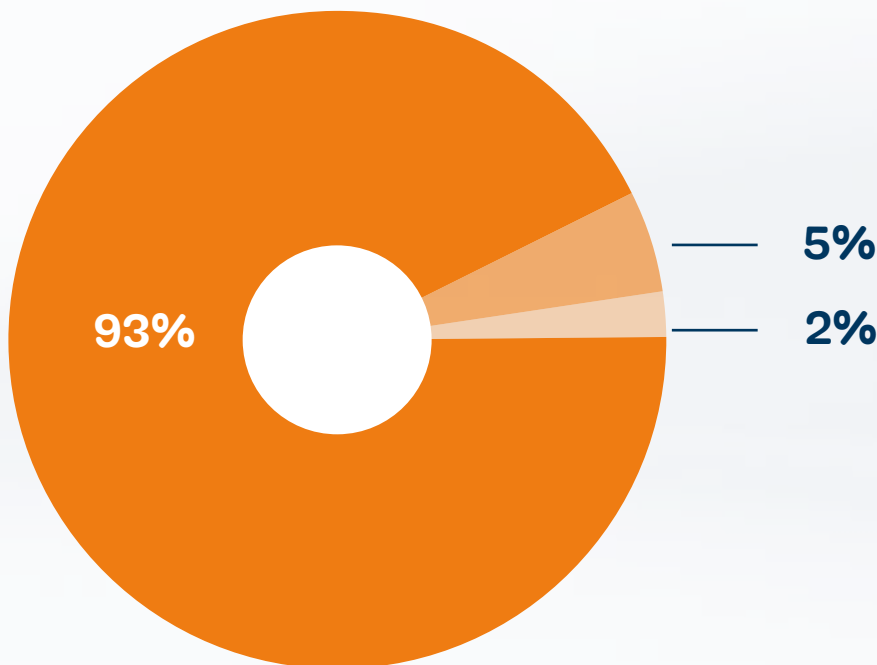

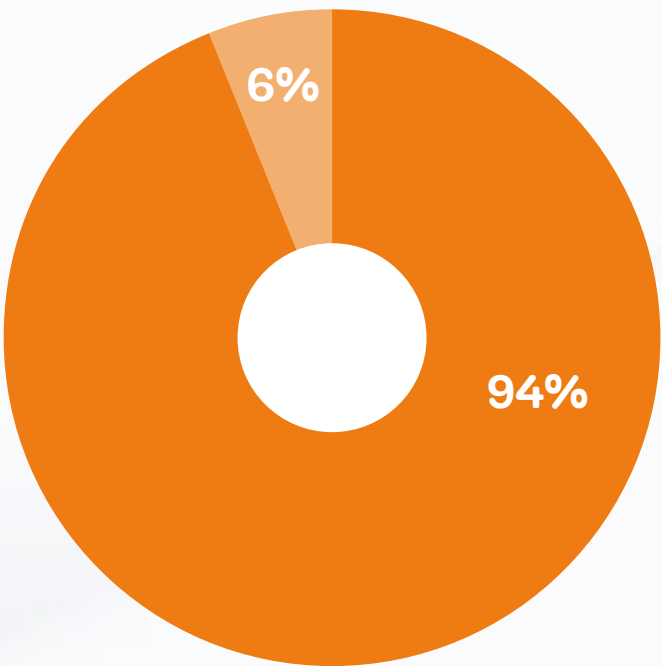

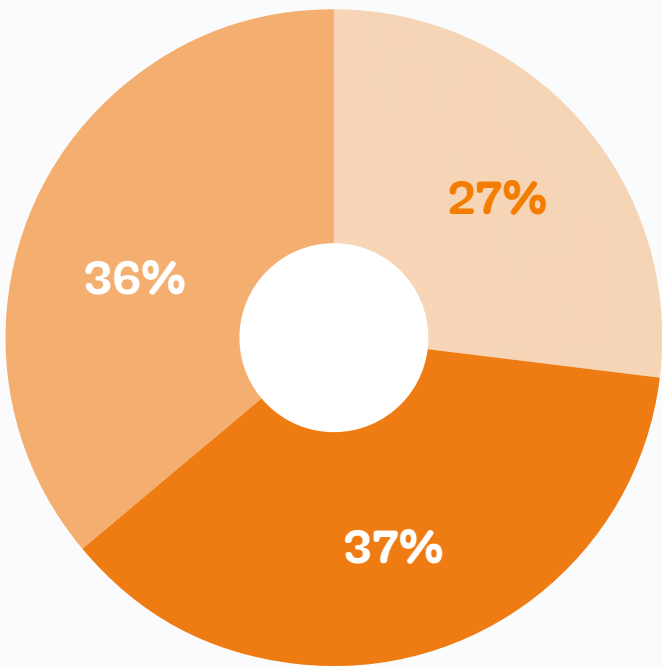
